Recovery Act Reporting Final Summary Florida Preliminary Summary February 17, 2009 through December 31, 2010

This report summarizes information submitted by organizations and entities in Florida related to funds provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (Recovery Act). This report covers the period through March 31, 2011 and is based on information submitted by organizations receiving Recovery Act funds with revisions as of May 25, 2011. Information is subject to further revision through mid-June at which time a final report will be updated.

The Recovery Act has two major sections, called "divisions". Division A of the Recovery Act appropriates funds through federal agencies to states, cities, counties and other organizations. These appropriated funds may be in the form of grants, contracts or loans. Section 1512 of the Recovery Act establishes new reporting requirements that all organizations receiving funds must meet to remain eligible for funding. Information on these grants, contracts or loans is posted on the federal web site, Recovery.

The Recovery Act, in Division B of the Act, also provided funding in federal mandatory or entitlement programs such as increased benefits for Unemployment Insurance, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance (Food Stamps), Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), etc. Because these benefits largely go directly to beneficiaries, there are no additional reporting requirements. Information on these funds is generally not included in the maps on the Recovery.gov web site. This information is included in the attached report to provide comprehensive information on the scope of Recovery Act funding.

The information on awards and expenditures is cumulative but the jobs information is for the reporting quarter only. Jobs information for the awards reported by organizations receiving awards is based on a count of Full-Time Equivalent jobs (FTE). Information reported by the Council of Economic Advisors is based on broader estimates that include all Recovery Act funds.

The summary information posted on the federal website also includes a relatively small number of obvious reporting errors. The summary information included in the attached tables has been refined to exclude those reporting errors according to data analysis protocols that are explained in the technical addendum attached.

The information in this report was compiled by Don Winstead. He was formerly the Special Advisor to Governor Charlie Crist for implementation of the Recovery Act. He now has a consulting firm in Tallahassee (Don Winstead Consulting, LLC). These reports were compiled based on procedures and protocols developed while serving as Special Advisor to the Governor, but the information is the responsibility of Don Winstead Consulting, LLC and is provided as a service to the people of Florida solely for information.



Technical Summary Obvious Reporting Errors

The Recovery Act reporting process was an extraordinary effort and represented significant progress in transparency. It was not, however, without its technical challenges. The reporting system used the "award number" as the key identifier. In the cumulative files used to display totals on the maps and charts on the Recovery.gov web site, awards (including contracts, grants and loans) and connected each reporting period through use of the award number. As long as the award number is used consistently, the system accurately reports the cumulative totals. If there was an error in the award number, no matter how slight, the matching process does not work and the cumulative reports showed the award amount multiple times. The problem was hard to detect because there is no uniform method in the federal government for assigning award numbers. After this problem was identified, a procedure was developed to connect these reports, but the error is not always detected and the process does not always work. When an error is found that is older than the most recent quarter, the recipient cannot fix the problem and must rely on the federal agency to make the correction. Here are some examples of how the problem develops.

- 1. In Q3, 2009, Applied Technology Systems, Inc. reported a contract award of \$27,836 to perform some construction at a Job Corps site in Jacksonville, FL. This was reported under award number "JO7UA00014 MOD19".
- In Q4, 2009, Applied Technology Systems, Inc. again reported this contract award of \$27,836, but reported it under award number, "DOLJ07UA00014- MODIFICATION # 19". The system did not recognize these as the same award, so they both appeared.
- In subsequent periods, the same award was reported under award number "DOLJ07UA00014" and the Order Number field in the reporting system contained the notation, "Mod 19". In Quarter 3, 2010, the award was reported as completed.

Because the award numbers differ in the reports, the system does not recognize these as the same award. The cumulative file includes the completed award of \$27,836 and also includes the incomplete awards under the erroneous award numbers reported in Q3, 2009 and Q4, 2009. Therefore the totals for Florida based on the place of performance are overstated by \$55,672.

To avoid overstating the totals in this report, awards containing this type of obvious reporting error have been excluded. This is accomplished by identifying awards where the year and quarter are earlier than the reporting period and the Final Report indicator is "No" or the Project Status is not "Completed". Nationally, we have found that approximately 2.4 % of the Recovery Act funding is overstated due to errors of this type, while in Florida the overstatement is about 1.5 % of the total.
